The Town of Wayland, Massachusetts

Community Profile

The Town of Wayland, located west of Boston in Middlesex County, was originally established in 1639 as the first settlement of the Sudbury plantation. The early settlers' economy was based on agriculture although some industries, such as grist and saw milling, grew from the available water power supply. The town is now an affluent suburban community within easy commuting distance of Boston and retains no indications of its early industrial history.

Wayland was incorporated in 1780 as East Sudbury. The Town received its present name in 1835. The town was named after Francis Wayland, a preacher and president of Brown University. Francis Wayland is credited with establishing one of the first free libraries in Wayland, Massachusetts, in 1848.

The school system is a source of pride to the community, which feels that Wayland's school population receives one of the best educations the state has to offer. Wayland has spent considerable time and effort establishing and protecting quiet, handsome neighborhoods of spacious homes. Townspeople have funded the purchase of property to maintain open space and have been aided in retaining the rural character for the town by the establishment of a national wildlife preserve. In addition, a portion of scenic Lake Cochituate lies within Wayland. The town maintains a municipal beach on the lake.

The abundant pasturage along the Sudbury River that attracted the original settlers is evident today at the town's Cow Common conservation area and extensive Great Meadows National Wildlife Refuge areas. Wayland and Sudbury residents established the Sudbury Valley Trust in 1953 in part to protect these lands. Today Wayland is in the top five communities in the state in conservation acreage.

Demographic Information

Public Library use is influenced by such factors as education, income, employment, and age. In the *2012 State of America's Libraries: A Report from the American Library Association*, 58 percent of those responding to a national survey said they had a library card, and the largest group was women, especially working women. College graduates and those with a household income of more than \$100,000 were also well represented among card holders, according to the survey. More detailed demographic information for Wayland is available through the 2010 U.S. Census data.

The Wayland Free Public Library

Founded in 1848, the Wayland Free Public Library (WFPL) was one of the first free public libraries established in the United States. However, the library movement began in Wayland much earlier. In 1796, Rev. Josiah Bridge, pastor of the First Church, organized the East Sudbury Social Library. By 1832, the Library's collection had grown from a first purchase of 36 volumes to 227 volumes, all kept in the homes of the librarians. In 1815, Rev. John Burt Wight developed a collection of 300 moral and religious books known as the "East Sudbury Charitable Library." Both of these early libraries formed the original collection of the Wayland Free Public Library when it was established in the Town Hall in 1850.

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In 1847, Rev. Francis Wayland, President of Brown University, offered \$500 to be matched by the citizens of Wayland for the purpose of founding a town library. The sum was matched by donations amounting to \$553.90 from 208 persons at a Town Meeting in 1848. Dr. Wayland's friend, Judge Edward Mellen, expressed doubts about the Town's right to tax for library support. As a result, Rev. Wight, a Representative in the General Court, introduced a bill which resulted in the Library Act of 1851 making it legal to raise and spend public funds in order to "establish and maintain libraries for the use of the inhabitants thereof."

When Wayland's first official Town Hall was built, a room was set aside for a library. After the passage of the Library Act, the existing supply of books was moved there. The first books were circulated in 1850. By 1879, the library had been moved to the new Town Hall across the street. Not long after, plans for the present library were discussed.

In 1900, Wayland celebrated the completion of the handsome red brick building that still stands today as the Wayland Free Public Library. Nearly all of the funds to construct the building were given to the Town by Warren G. Roby, a Wayland resident who had already donated the land on which the new building was to be built.

The architect for the new building was Samuel W. Mead of Weston. Travel in Italy gave Mead an interest in Roman architecture and Renaissance sculpture which he incorporated in his design: the rotunda, the strong use of columns, the red tiled roof, and an interior frieze reflect this interest.

Since the 1900 construction of the Library, many renovations and improvements have been made. In 1988, a new wing was added to the Library and renovations were made throughout the older section. In the intervening years, use of the Library by Wayland's ever-growing population has mushroomed, and its role in the community has grown to encompass far more than mere book lending.

In 2002, when the Library Planning Committee assessed the community's vision for the Wayland Library's future, the Trustees began investigating the possibility of expanding the building at the present site. The Library Building Feasibility Study Committee demonstrated in their architect's report in 2005 that there are some serious and costly impediments to building at the present site. With this in mind, the Trustees are presently investigating alternative sites for a new Library building, which will better serve the changing needs of the community in the 21st Century.

At the same time, the Library administration is making improvements to the old facility to make it as useful and welcoming to residents as the building will permit.

The Wayland Free Public Library is a founding member of the Minuteman Library Network (MLN), a group of over forty public and academic libraries that share a library automation system for circulation, acquisitions, reference and cataloging. Using the MLN database, patrons may request materials located in other libraries and have them delivered to Wayland for pickup. The Wayland Free Public Library is also a member of the Massachusetts Library System, which provides daily truck delivery of interlibrary loans, training programs, and other services to its member libraries.

The Wayland Free Public Library offers a number of educational and cultural programs throughout the year. These include a fall slide/art lecture art, a winter classics series, a spring Shakespeare festival, a monthly book discussion group, and other literary programs. The Library supports local

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artists by exhibiting bimonthly art shows in the Raytheon Room and monthly exhibits in the main level foyer. The Library also offers a variety of children’s programs including story times, crafts, summer reading, book groups, performances, and writing workshops.

Planning Methodology

Library Director Ann Knight and the Trustees of the Wayland Free Public Library invited library consultants to submit proposals to facilitate a long-range planning process as developed by the Massachusetts Library System. Sondra Vandermark was hired as the Wayland Free Public Library planning consultant.

On February 29, 2012, Sondra Vandermark met with Ann Knight, Library Director and the Board of Trustees to determine the timeline for the Wayland Free Public Library planning process.

On April 5, 2012 Sondra Vandermark met with the Staff/Trustee Task Force. At this meeting the Taskforce discussed the content and implementation of the online survey.

Library administration identified residents who were invited to attend Community Committee meetings on April 25, and May 16, 2012. On April 25, participants had an orientation to the long-range planning process. The orientation was followed by the Library Director's overview of the community and the Library's programs and current trends. The Committee then participated in a Library Strength, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) analysis exercise. (See Community Committee SWOT Analysis in Appendix A)

The Community Committee held its second meeting on May 16, 2012. At this meeting, the Committee participants briefly reviewed the SWOT analysis and then spent time brainstorming a potential vision statement for Wayland. The participants each had 6 votes to prioritize the vision statement components. (See Community Vision Statement Appendix B) The final activity of the evening was to propose draft goals for the Library. The goals will help the Wayland Free Public Library move the community toward the Community Vision.

The Staff/Trustee Task Force met on May 18 to plan activities for the Staff In-Service Day. The Trustees closed the Library for the Staff In-Service program on May 21, 2012. This was an opportunity for Library staff to respond to the Community Committee Library SWOT analysis from the April 25th Community Committee Meeting, the Community Vision Statement, and draft goals developed during the second meeting of the Community Committee on May 16th. The Staff also participated in its own Library SWOT analysis. (See Staff SWOT analysis Appendix C) Using the Community Committee draft goals, the Wayland Free Public Library staff developed objectives and activities to implement the goals.

The Library posted an online survey of "20 quick questions to help us plan." The survey received input from 467 individuals from both inside and outside the Library. The online survey was available for approximately three weeks, with the deadline for responses on June 16, 2012. (See survey results in Appendix D.)

Using the materials developed by the Community Committee, the Staff/Trustee Task Force, the library staff, and responses from the online survey, Consultant Sondra Vandermark wrote a draft plan that was presented to the Staff/Trustee Task Force and, after revision, to the Board of Trustees.

The Wayland Free Public Library Mission Statement

The Library Mission Statement is posted on the Library's web site. The Statement says:

The mission of the Wayland Free Public Library is to be a free and accessible marketplace of ideas, information, and culture that fosters learning, community, and information literacy. The Library provides open and guided access to a wide variety of media and programs to inform, inspire, and empower all its patrons in their pursuit of lifelong learning, personal enrichment, and cultural understanding. In so doing, the Library seeks to promote the free exchange of ideas necessary to the effective conduct of a democracy in an ever-changing world.

Assessment of User Needs

The Library administration has worked to identify community needs and determine how the Library can help meet those needs. The work included establishing a community-based planning committee and surveying the public. The Library posted an online survey of "20 quick questions to help us plan" to obtain data from the public. 467 people responded to the survey. For the complete results, see Appendix D.

Statements of community needs were developed using the Community Committee's Library SWOT analysis, the Community Vision Statement, the Staff Library SWOT analysis, and responses to the online survey of "20 quick questions to help us plan."

The Wayland Free Public Library is a community gathering place where Wayland residents meet and exchange ideas and have access to diverse recreational activities. Users want the Library to offer good coffee, outdoor seating along the rail trail, and a better bike rack. The Library is popular for a number of programs, such as a spring Shakespeare festival, a monthly book discussion group, and other literary programs. The Library supports local artists by exhibiting bimonthly art shows in the Raytheon Room and monthly exhibits in the main level foyer. Residents want more programs including hands-on computer classes, adult author visits, musical performances, and town wide issues forums. The Library will use program suggestions from the online survey to develop new events.

For children, the Library offers a variety of programs including story times, crafts, book groups, performances, and writing workshops. The Summer Reading Program is very popular. There is interest in science-based programs. In addition, it is suggested that a children's art show be added annually.

Community Committee participants and respondents to the online survey requested more hours—additional summer weekend hours, restoring 6-9 p.m. Thursday hours, additional school-year weekend hours, and restoring the 5-6 p.m. Friday hour. Residents generally want more evening hours all year and more weekend hours in the summer. For busy residents, evenings and weekends may be the only time they can visit the Library. Residents want more than three hours on summer

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Saturdays. Limited hours have a negative impact on library use. It should be noted that it will be difficult to expand hours without increasing staff.

Participants in the Community Committee and Community Survey respondents identified numerous shortcomings in the current facility. The traffic on streets in front of and near the Library is a deterrent to greater public use. For some, it influences the decision to visit other libraries. Also, the children's area is too small, the Library lacks private study rooms, and there is no separate young adult/teen area. The Wayland Library administration, along with several study groups over the years, has participated in efforts to increase the size of the facility after the new wing was added in 1988. As mentioned earlier in this report, the Trustees are currently investigating alternative sites for a new Library building.

At the same time, the Library administration is making improvements to the old facility to make it more useful and welcoming to residents. The Community Committee participants and respondents to the online survey were enthusiastic about the improvements being made in the Rotunda, which is being restored to its original beauty and will be used as a reading room.

The Library uses technology, such as self-checkout, to help the staff keep up with an annual circulation of 232,500 items. Library patrons most frequently use the Library to borrow materials such as books/audiobooks, DVDs/movies, CDs/music, and newspapers/magazines. Although residents value participation in the Minuteman Library Network and the resulting access to millions of network holdings, they would like to have more materials in Wayland. Residents want both the number and the variety of holdings available in the Wayland Free Public Library to increase. Unfortunately, the Library does not have the space to continue to expand its collection.

Residents regularly use electronic devices. In order of frequency of use, they include personal computers, DVD players, smart phones, CD players, MP3 players, eReaders (Kindles and Nooks), and iPads. Residents want to have library materials that they can use on their devices.

Wayland Library users want the Library to provide newer technologies such as a music download service and video download (streaming) service. Twenty percent of survey respondents use downloadable digital eBooks or downloadable audiobooks. Wayland Library users want more of these materials.

Wayland residents would like more reading support from the Library. Important national studies such as the National Endowment for the Arts Report "To Read or Not To Read" (2007) indicate that reading is on the decline in the United States. Children and teens prefer gaming and other electronic pastimes to reading. Computer use and media checkouts of audio and video products have been increasing while circulation of books is declining in many libraries. To counteract this trend, more reading support will include additional book groups and storytimes for children. And, the Library will continue to develop materials for the "Reader's Corner for Kids" on the Wayland Free Public Library website.

Extended partnerships between the public library and the school district will also help encourage reading. The WFPL posts the school summer reading lists on its website. However, collaborations can be expanded. For example, better access to collections at both the public library and the schools can be developed through links between the Wayland Free Public Library and school websites. A coordinated effort with the school system will make available curriculum resources aligned with class

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assignments available to students at the WFPL. More interactive programs will be provided -- children need the socialization and interaction with others. Group projects, whether crafts or scriptwriting or community service, are also important.

The Wayland Library has a Summer Reading Program for Teens with prizes (donated in 2012 by a local organization) to entice participation. There is interest in developing a larger presence for teens (grades 9 and higher) at the Library. Plans are underway to develop a young adult/teen space and redistribute young adult materials from the children's room.

Free access to the Internet and public computers are highly valued by residents. Residents' weekly Internet use at the Wayland Library remains steady. During the past three years an average of 675 Library patrons have used the Internet weekly, confirming the popularity of this service. In addition, the Library makes available new technologies, including Kindle and Nook loans, and tablets for use in the Library. The Wayland Library's website is used to search the Minuteman online catalog, reserve a book, connect to "my library account," and reserve museum passes. Also the user-friendly Library website provides access to the electronic reference databases 24/7. The databases are available for student projects and other research even when the Library is closed.

During the past decade, public libraries have experienced higher customer service expectations. Libraries are expected to provide online services such as reading lists and email notifications. Media formats change rapidly, requiring libraries to process new formats; however libraries often lack the technology and/or budget to accommodate user wants. The Wayland Library is experiencing the same high customer service expectations as the rest of the nation.

Interlibrary loan and assistance in finding information also are valued services. The WFPL needs to provide more classes to instruct residents on using basic library online and print resources. As interaction with librarians by email, chat, and other online mechanisms becomes more commonplace, Wayland Library staff should become more available to help remote users with the variety of available electronic materials.

The popularity of social networking websites such as Facebook and YouTube has affected Internet use and social behavior. The steady use of the Internet by the public at the Wayland Library has been mentioned before in this section of the *Long Range/Strategic Plan*. However, there is another important use of such media: electronic marketing. The Wayland Free Public Library can more effectively market its services and programs (such as online reference materials, e-materials, and outreach services) so residents are better informed about these under-utilized services. Facebook, Twitter, QR Codes, and the Library's website are tools the staff can use to greater effect. A link to the online Long Range Planning Survey, "20 quick questions to help us plan," was available on the Library's website. In addition, there was a posted a link to the online survey on the Wayland Free Public Library Facebook page. This was a good use of this social networking tool. Library staff has identified a number of ways to use social networking tools to communicate with Wayland Library users about the Library's services.

Identifying the needs of Wayland residents means the Library can better focus its resources to meet those needs. The Wayland Free Public Library Planning Process through its Assessment of User Needs has helped determine the Library's priorities for the 5-Year Plan.

GOALS, OBJECTIVES, and ACTIVITIES

The following Goals, Objectives, and Activities were developed using the Assessment of User Needs. The Assessment of User Needs is information gathered through the Community Committee's Library SWOT analysis, the Community Vision Statement, the Staff Library SWOT analysis, and responses to the online survey of "20 quick questions to help us plan."

The Assessment of User Needs is used to develop the Goals, Objectives, and Activities. Sometimes more detailed clarity is required to develop a goal. In such cases, the original source is used to help articulate the goal.

For example, components of the Community Vision Statement provide a foundation for the development of the Library's Goals. One component of the Community Vision Statement is "residents will benefit from continued programming for all ages," which helped in the creation of Goal I, Objectives 1-2 through 1-6. Another example is "residents will benefit from expanded collaboration between Town groups, including some integration of schools and Wayland Free Public Library services" which helped in the creation of Goal II, Objective 2-3 and Goal III, Objective 3-3.

During the SWOT analysis, the Community Committee identified as weaknesses the "lack of a young adult section," which helped in the creation of Goal III, Objective 3-1. Because the Library facility often is perceived as too small, the SWOT analysis opportunity statement that Wayland "replace some print materials with eBooks as electronic materials won't take as much space" helped in the creation of Goal I, Objective 1-1. "Human contact (opportunity to meet neighbors)" was identified as an opportunity, which helped in the creation of Goal IV.

During the staff SWOT analysis, the WFPL staff identified their desire for more technology training and the time to practice new skills, which led to Goal V, Object 5-6. Specific facility areas mentioned as needing improvement include providing a YA/teen space, which led to Goal III, Objective 3-1 and an information/reference area reconfiguration, which resulted in Goal IV, Objective 4-1.

The online survey provided considerable information. Respondents identified a music download service, more adult programs, and video download (streaming) service as library services they want, which helped in the creation of Goal I, Objective 1-1. There is considerable interest in maintaining the Wayland Free Public Library as a community center or gathering space, a fact that resulted in the creation of Goal IV.

These are just a few examples of the Assessment of User Needs sources that influenced the development of Goals, Objectives, and Activities. The Goals, Objectives, and Activities for the Wayland Free Public Library Long Range/Strategic Plan, FY2013-FY2018 will help the Library focus on services to meet community needs.

GOAL 1: The Library collects materials and offers programs that satisfy the reading, lifelong learning, literacy, leisure, and entertainment needs of its users.

Objective 1-1: Each year of the plan, the Library will increase public access to digital content (eBooks, downloadable audiobooks, downloadable music, and streaming video) by 10%.

Activity: Increase ownership of digital content in all material types.

Activity: Investigate alternative delivery methods for music and movies (e.g. streaming).

Activity: Collect some foreign language materials in digital formats.

Activity: Maintain membership in MLN for network-provided digital content.

Activity: Maintain membership in MLS for system-provided digital content.

Objective 1-2: The Library will continue to offer a minimum of 100 adult programs each year, and using current documented average annual attendance as a base, increase participation by 10% or more during the life of the Plan. (i.e., by the end of 5 years).

Activity: Provide at least three music programs and/or concerts annually.

Activity: Provide a minimum of two Library arts/crafts programs annually.

Activity: Provide more film programs through a film club.

Activity: Develop more clubs that will help with program ideas (i.e., craft, science, and finance).

Activity: Market the programs through the Library's website, Facebook, Twitter, and Town Bulletin Boards.

Activity: Count the number of participants at each program to measure increases in attendance against the documented base.

Objective 1-3: Through a brief survey at the end of selected programs, at least 80% of adult responders will indicate that the programs met their needs and expectations.

Activity: At the end of selected programs, implement a brief survey for attendees.

Activity: Compile responses to help plan future programs.

Objective 1-4: By FY2014, at least ten programs of special interest to older adults will be offered, with an average attendance of ten.

Activity: Offer classes on technology at WFPL.

Activity: Offer programs on eBook use at WFPL.

Activity: Provide an annual retirement planning workshop.

Activity: Work with Council On Aging (COA) to identify programs of interest to seniors.

Activity: Advertise WFPL programs at the Senior Center.

Activity: Count the number of participants at each program to measure increases in attendance against the documented base.

Objective 1-5: Through a brief survey at the end of selected programs, at least 80% of older adult responders will indicate that the programs met their needs and expectations.

Activity: At the end of selected programs, implement a brief survey for attendees.

Activity: Compile responses to help plan future programs.

Objective 1-6: The Library will offer four book discussion groups for readers.

Activity: In FY2014, the Library will institute a Summer Reading Program for adults.

Activity: Institute book groups for elementary and/or middle school students.

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Activity: Create book groups for certain population groups (men, women, etc.)

Activity: Continue to develop Reader's Advisory resources in print and online.

Activity: Promote the online tool, NoveList, provided through membership in MLN. (FY2013-FY2018)

Activity: Create a Poetry Festival for Kids as part of "Wayland Reads"

Objective 1-7: In periodic online surveys, 75% of Library users will say they are satisfied with the extent to which WFPL's collection of materials is up-to-date.

Activity: By the end of FY2013, the staff will update the WFPL Collection Development Policy.

Activity: Continue to use Minuteman Library Network (MLN) circulation statistics reports and ILL requests of Wayland residents to analyze collection use trends and tailor purchases to meet Wayland Library user needs.

Activity: Purchase new, high-demand nonfiction in various formats identified in collection use trends. (FY2013-ongoing)

Activity: Library users will have a collection that is continuously weeded using the practices outlined in CREW: A Weeding Manual for Modern Libraries. (FY2013-ongoing)

Activity: Expand the Library's book collection, DVDs, and Books on CDs as supported by LRP online survey results. (FY2013-ongoing)

Activity: Use new book display areas to highlight portions of the collection (e.g., seasonal, crafts, politics, award winners).

Activity: Use Facebook and Twitter to promote MLN's online catalog as the best way for people to gain access to Library materials.

Activity: Maintain membership in MLN for enhanced patron service through reciprocal borrowing. (FY2013-FY2018)

Objective 1-8: Wayland residents will have increased access to a minimum of 10 additional Wayland local history materials and/or identified special items of interest each year of the plan.

Activity: Digitize local history materials in partnership with the Town Clerk and/or other Town departments and organizations.

Activity: Use staff and volunteers to identify and digitize special materials.

GOAL II: The library will provide children from infancy through age 13 with an array of materials in a variety of formats and a variety of programs that encourage a love of reading and intellectual curiosity.

Objective 2-1: At least 75% of parents or caregivers of infants, toddlers, and preschool children using the WFPL will state that they had access to collections, programs, and services that help the children develop a lifelong love of books, reading, and learning.

Activity: Provide a minimum of eight storytime series, craft programs, and/or family programs annually.

Activity: Publicize "Reader's Corner for Kids" as a tool for book selection.

Activity: Expand the collection of new, high-demand children's materials by a minimum of 10% annually.

Activity: Continue to weed the children's collection using the CREW method.

Activity: Visit preschools and schools with materials regarding WFPL services and contents.

Activity: Create Poetry Festival for Kids as part of "Wayland Reads."

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Objective 2-2: At least 50% of parents or caregivers of children participating in the Summer Reading Program will state that the SRP was valuable as an incentive to keep their children reading over the summer.

Activity: Provide annual Summer Reading Programs using the MLS materials and supported by the Friends of the Wayland Library funding for performers, supplies, and other materials.

Activity: Annually survey a minimum of 30 parents or caregivers about the value of the SRP.

Objective 2-3: During the 5 years of the plan, the Library will show at least a 10% increase in circulation of materials purchased for school aged children.

Activity: Develop collaboration with schools, including at least one meeting between school librarians and WFPL staff annually.

Activity: Meet with Parent Teacher Organizations to identify areas of cooperation.

Activity: Advertise events using school newsletters and the website.

Activity: Collaborate with school librarians on developing summer reading lists; continue to post summer reading lists on the WFPL website.

Activity: Make presentations in schools and libraries to students with the intention of increasing awareness of Library resources and services that help students succeed in school.

Activity: Investigate the possibility of tours of the WFPL for students visiting the Grout-Heard House Museum; give card brochure to children to take home to get Library cards.

Activity: Provide student instruction on how to use electronic resources for school assignments.

Activity: Collaborate with school librarians on determining areas of the WFPL collection that need to be expanded to better support homework assignments.

Activity: Continue to provide easy-to-use links to online databases from the WFPL website.

Activity: Promote and develop links between the elementary and middle school library media centers and WFPL's catalog.

Goal III: Young adult/teen residents will have access to a YA/teen space, a collection of current and popular materials in a variety of formats, and a variety of programs that enhance leisure time, stimulate thought, and expand knowledge.

Objective 3-1: By the end of FY2014, 50% of young adults/teens answering a brief library survey at school will state that they have used the YA/teen space.

Activity: In FY2103 provide a dedicated library space on the main level of the facility for YA/teen patrons.

Activity: In FY2013, using standard library collection development tools, identify materials currently housed in the children's room that are more appropriate for older teens and move the materials to the new YA/teen area.

Activity: In FY2013, apply for a "Serving 'Tweens and Teens" Grant from the MBLC to continue development of the YA/teen space to meet the library needs of Wayland's young adults/teens

Activity: In FY2014, implement first year of Serving 'Tweens and Teens grant.

Activity: In May FY2014, survey students at the Wayland middle and high school to assess degree of satisfaction with YA/teen space.

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Activity: In FY2015, continue implementation of 'Tweens and Teens grant, revising grant goals as necessary to meet library needs identified in the FY2014 survey.

Activity: In May FY2015, survey students at the Wayland middle and high school to assess degree of satisfaction with YA/teen space.

Objective 3-2: Twenty percent of young adult/teens will say that new materials, programs, eBook purchases, graphic novels, and other possible services are better than they were in FY2013.

Activity: Using the Teen Advisory Board (TAB), develop lists of ideas for new materials, programs, eBook purchases, graphic novels, and other possible services.

Activity: Schedule at least four TAB meetings a year (September-May) for all members to contribute ideas for new materials and to help plan events held specifically for teens. (FY2013-FY2018)

Activity: Starting in FY2014, schedule a minimum of four young adult/teen programs each year.

Activity: By FY2014, explore, develop and implement a policy for buying eBooks that complement school collections. (FY2013-FY2018)

Activity: By FY2014, weed, update, and promote the graphic novel portion of the young adult collection and record and analyze circulation statistics.

Activity: Continue to participate in the Minuteman Library Network and other library-resource-sharing networks to provide information and materials related to teens not available at the WFPL.

Objective 3-3: During the 5 years of the plan the Library will show at least a 10% increase in circulation of materials purchased for young adults.

Activity: Meet annually with Wayland school media specialists and teachers to compare collections and ensure that the Library staff has the training and materials to support students in their formal learning assignments.

Activity: Continue to provide easy-to-use links to online databases on the WFPL website.

Activity: Schedule periodic meetings with the Library Director and/or Youth Services Librarian and school faculty and/or administrators to promote Library services and resources that can contribute to students' academic success.

Activity: Promote and develop links between the middle and high school library media centers and WFPL's catalog.

Activity: Obtain information about school curriculum school librarians for WFPL collection development.

Goal IV: The Library will continue to be perceived as a neighborhood center -- the Town's Living Room -- that is an attractive, safe, comfortable and welcoming place for Wayland residents to meet, work, and interact with others.

Objective 4-1: A minimum of 75% of respondents to a periodic online survey will indicate that the Library is an attractive, safe, comfortable and welcoming place.

Activity: Before the end of FY2013, complete the renovation of the Rotunda and equip the space with comfortable furnishings for a quiet reading room.

Activity: Study and if it is deemed appropriate setup a WFPL café; at a minimum provide coffee or tea. (FY2013-ongoing)

Wayland Free Public Library Long Range/Strategic Plan FY2013-FY2018

Activity: Before the end of FY2013, rebrand the information desk, highlighting the area with digital signage.

Activity: Continue art displays as detailed on the WFPL website “Exhibits and Displays in the Library – Policy.” (ongoing)

Activity: In FY2013, expand the potential of art displays by including students’ art works (both in Raytheon Room and in hallway), inviting children to the open houses, and meet the artists and teachers. (ongoing)

Activity: Exhibit preschool/elementary school student art in the lower level display cases.

Activity: Investigate and implement ways to take advantage of the Rail Trail going by the Library as an additional way for residents to get to the Library without increasing traffic.

Objective 4-2: Beginning in FY2014, a minimum of 50% of respondents to a periodic online survey will state that the Library provides educational and cultural programs and exhibits that fulfill patrons’ needs for enrichment and enjoyment.

Activity: Work with local organizations and groups to offer programs of interest to their constituents.

Activity: Sponsor or co-sponsor a “Wayland Reads” program, organizing discussions throughout Town on a chosen title or theme.

Activity: Continue to use Friends of the Wayland Library support to fund children and adult programming throughout the year, such as concerts, story tellers, and other educational and recreational events that enhance the role of the Library in the community.

Activity: Participate in the Town’s Holiday Open House with activities such as a gingerbread house, balloon maker for charity, music, and showing of films such as *It’s A Wonderful Life* and *Christmas Story* on an ongoing, rotating schedule throughout the open house. (ongoing)

Activity: Participate in Earth Day by making information about Friends of the Wayland Library membership, Library membership card availability, and brochures about library services.

Activity: Continue to use Friends of the Wayland Library funds to support the annual museum pass program.

Objective 4-3: In a FY2014, a target of 75% online survey respondents will state that the appearance of the downstairs entrance and foyer to the WFPL has improved.

Activity: By the end of FY2013, paint the downstairs entrance.

Activity: Install a handicapped access button.

Activity: Install ‘occupied/vacant’ locks on the downstairs restrooms.

Activity: Install a site map of the WFPL at the downstairs entrance.

Activity: Assign staff to keep bulletin boards organized and up-to-date. (ongoing)

Activity: Investigate providing bistro-style table and chairs for casual sitting.

GOAL V: The Library will be perceived as *the* place to go for things related to information and/or technology sharing — with the resources, technology, marketing, and trained staff to fulfill this perception. Wayland residents will think of the Library when they want to use new technologies.

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Objective 5-1: An online survey will show that a minimum of 75% of library technology users feel that library technology helps them meet their information needs.

- Activity: Continue to provide a minimum of 11 public access computers in working order.
- Activity: Continue to provide high-speed access to the Internet.
- Activity: Continue to provide wireless access to the Internet.
- Activity: Maintain a minimum of two self-check stations for adult and youth self-service.
- Activity: Identify opportunities and associated costs for expanding technology resources such as tablets, streaming video, etc.
- Activity: Publicize the MLN application that allows patrons to view accounts, renew various items, see what holds are ready for pick up, in transit, etc., as well as search the library network, or specific libraries within the network on an iPhone.
- Activity: Publicize the availability of library applications, such as Gale apps that provide 24/7 access to Gale resources available through MLS and MBLC contracts.
- Activity: Periodically, implement a brief survey of library users about WFPL technology.

Objective 5-2: Starting in FY2013, a minimum of 50% of the attendees participating in training opportunities provided by the Library will state that the training was useful.

- Activity: In each year of the plan, provide a minimum of 10 training opportunities on the use of the Internet, online databases, technology topics, social networking tools and/or eBooks.
- Activity: Implement a brief survey after selected training opportunity to measure usefulness.
- Activity: Provide learners of all ages with both formal and one-on-one training in the use of the library catalog and subscription databases. (ongoing)
- Activity: Provide FAQs and other tools that help users identify qualitative differences between free information on the Internet and online library resources that are funded by their tax dollars. (FY2013-FY2018)

Objective 5-3: Starting in FY2014, a minimum of 10% of respondents to a periodic online survey will indicate that they learned about the WFPL website and library services through social media such as Twitter, Facebook, and QR codes.

- Activity: Provide weekly tweets about the Library and its services.
- Activity: Promote the MLN App for the catalog.
- Activity: Use WayCAM TV for promotion of the WFPL website and library services.
- Activity: Provide tweets at least weekly about a feature of an online database, changing the online database tweeted at least bi-monthly.
- Activity: Provide updates on Facebook about an online database at least bi-monthly.
- Activity: Develop updates that relate to school assignments in collaboration with reference and youth services staff and school library.
- Activity: Continue to provide easy-to-use links to online databases from the WFPL website.
- Activity: Make available on the WFPL website FAQs guidance on how to evaluate information.
- Activity: Encourage people through training sessions and/or social networking tools to use the Library's website as an important portal for conducting research online.
- Activity: Develop a mobile site/app that WFPL users can access to learn about the website and library services.
- Activity: Develop a QR Code postcard to handout to market the WFPL website and library services.
- Activity: Investigate providing a "Text-a-Librarian" service on the website.

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Objective 5-6: During performance reviews, 90% of staff will indicate that they are more comfortable in assisting library users with new technologies as the result of training.

Activity: Starting in FY2013, through participation in MLN and MLS workshops and/or webinars, provide a minimum of one training session annually for staff on use of new technologies. (ongoing)

Activity: Offer training to the staff on new MLS/MBLC online database content.

Activity: Offer training to the staff on downloading eBooks and other digital formats.

Activity: Offer training to the staff on how to use social networking tools such as Facebook and Twitter.

Activity: As new technologies are implemented, provide staff training on the technologies.

Activity: Provide adequate time each month for staff to practice new skills.

Appendix B: Community Vision Statement

The resultant Community Vision Statement is a foundation for the development of the Library's Goals. The purpose of the Goals is to give direction to the Library as it helps Wayland move toward the Community Vision.

The Community Vision Statement components are:

- ❖ The Town of Wayland will have more green opportunities—more water, more solar power, more bikes, and fewer cars.
- ❖ Residents will have access to a variety of gathering places for different sized community groups.
- ❖ The Town of Wayland will work smarter, not harder—residents understand that the solution is NOT always more money or being bigger.
- ❖ Students will continue to have access to an excellent school system.
- ❖ The Town of Wayland will be more community centered—residents will be more able to have their needs met in the Town.
- ❖ Residents will benefit from expanded collaboration between Town groups, including some integration of schools and Wayland Free Public Library services.
- ❖ Residents will benefit from continued programming for all ages.
- ❖ The Town of Wayland will provide some public transportation (trolley, bike hubs, etc.) and improved walking venues for residents (such as trails and walk-ways in the center of Town).






