
DYSTOPIAN/SCI-FI BOOK GROUP 2021-2022

No prior experience with science fiction is required! We welcome novices as well as serious readers of the genre.



Our universe is ruled by physics and faster than light travel is not possible – until the discovery of The Flow, an extra-dimensional field we can access at certain points in space-time that transport us to other worlds, around other stars.



October 2021

The Calculating Stars by Mary Robinette Kowal

On a cold spring night in 1952, a huge meteorite fell to earth and obliterated much of the east coast of the United States, including Washington D.C. The ensuing climate cataclysm will soon render the earth inhospitable for humanity, as the last such meteorite did for the dinosaurs. The looming threat calls for a radically accelerated effort to colonize space, and requires a much larger share of humanity to take part in the process.

The Space Between Worlds by Micaiah Johnson


Multiverse travel is finally possible, but there's just one catch: No one can visit a world where their counterpart is still alive.

The Light Brigade by Kameron Hurley



A Canticle for Leibowitz by Walter M. Miller Jr.

In a nightmarish ruined world slowly awakening to the light after sleeping in darkness, the infant rediscoveries of science are secretly nourished by cloistered monks dedicated to the study and preservation of the relics and writings of the blessed Saint Isaac Leibowitz.



April 2022

Blindness by José Saramago

In a provocative parable of loss, disorientation, and weakness, a city is hit by an epidemic of "white blindness" whose victims are confined to a vacant mental hospital, while a single eyewitness to the nightmare guides seven oddly assorted strangers through the barren urban landscape.



May 2022

Borne by Jeff VanderMeer

In a ruined, nameless city of the future, a woman named Rachel, who makes her living as a scavenger, finds a creature she names "Borne" entangled in the fur of Mord, a gigantic, despotic bear. Driven insane by his torture at the Company, a biotech organization that did experiments on him, Mord terrorizes the city even as he provides sustenance for scavengers like Rachel.



June 2022

Klara and the Sun by Kazuo Ishiguro

Here is the story of Klara, an Artificial Friend with outstanding observational qualities, who, from her place in the store, watches carefully the behavior of those who come in to browse, and of those who pass on the street outside. She remains hopeful that a customer will soon choose her.
